1 **The Lord is a Strong Fortress** - (2 Sam 22:2,3). Saul sought to pursue and harm David, but God was like a hedge around David. It was David's faith in God that produced the barrier around him. The one who protected David was and is the omnipotent (all powerful) God of heaven and earth.

2 **The Lord is a Sheltering Fortress** - (Ps 18:2). The Lord is a shelter in the time of storm. He preserves us from our enemies. When you serve God and live by right principles, you will always have those who will regard you as an enemy. Don't be afraid of them. Just do right and live to please God not man.


3 **The Lord is a Sure Fortress** - (Ps 31:3). In days of perplexity, the Lord will be our guide. The Lord will direct and lead us in the right paths if we will only commit ourselves to Him. When we don't know what to do, He can show us.

4 **The Lord is a Settled Fortress** - (Ps 71:3). In Him we can, in the words of Ps.71:3, "continually resort." We can hold to His unchanging hand because we know the Lord does not change. He is always the same (Heb.13:5).

5 **The Lord is a Supreme Fortress** - (Ps 91:2). No one can excel or surpass the Lord. No one can do what He is able to do.

6 **The Lord is a Suitable Fortress** - (Ps 144:2). The Lord is a suitable fortress for all. He is suitable for you, if you are a sinner under the burden of guilt and sin, for He alone can save, cleanse and pardon. He is suitable for you, if you are a believer weighed down with cares and trouble, for He is the great burden-bearer. He is suitable for you, if you are in need of guidance and direction, for He is our path.

What do you work at?

After 33 years in financial services I was retired early last July following a review of my employer's business strategy which means life is now much more stress free than before.

What do you enjoy doing in your spare time?

Playing with my 2 grandchildren, tinkering on the computer, walking and eating out - Indian and Chinese.

How long have you been coming to Ballee Baptist?

Sandra and I joined Ballee in 1991

Do you have any specific roles or interests within the church?

I have served as a Deacon for a number of years and more recently have been assisting the Treasurer, Stephen Irons, to collect and record offerings prior to lodging in the Northern Bank.

Are you involved in any other work for God?

I am a member of the local Branch of Gideons International. This involves undertaking Church services to tell of the Work, placing Scriptures in hotels, hospitals and also presenting New Testaments to pupils in secondary level education.

How would you summarise your experience of Ballee Baptist?

I have always felt at home at Ballee from my first visit. The teaching is excellent with a positive balance which I find particularly encouraging.

Can you tell us something from your Christian life that might encourage us?

For years I had heard testimonies where people could give the date, time and place, the name of the speaker as well as the text of Scripture etc. I came to doubt my salvation because although I knew it was at a tent meeting on the Church Road in Randalstown when I was about 10 years old I do not remember much else. However I came to realise it is the fact of there being a definite time when repentance took place, not the ability to quote the time and date etc, that matters.

What is your favourite verse and why?

Many verses have special appeal at different times but probably my favourite is Romans 8:1. 'There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus...'

That 'now' is very important and gives me the assurance that I am already forgiven and am as certain of Heaven today as though I was already there. I don't have to worry will I 'make the grade' when I die.

Have you any requests for prayer?

From a Gideon perspective I would value prayer that we will continue to have access to all schools, hotels and hospitals in our area. Also, pray that men who are qualified spiritually and occupationally will be led to join and get involved in the Gideon ministry.

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The Power of Prayer!

As you all know, I spent almost fifteen weeks in Antrim Area Hospital from 7th March to the 17th June. I had been admitted because of an irregular heart beat, and after an earlier scan had revealed a leaking valve in my heart. While I was there I kept a daily journal and on reading it I found some interesting things which I want to share with you. I have very little recollection of my first three days in hospital. I was having blackouts, the first one had happened in the car as I was being driven down to Antrim.

As I lay in intensive care unable to get out of bed, linked up to a monitor, a drip, an oxygen mask, with bruises and confusion I overheard this question being asked "Do you believe in the power of prayer?" The answer quickly and emphatically was given as "No, certainly not!" I was very surprised at the response, as I had prayed constantly "Lord help me" realising how ill I really was. "For thou art my hope, O Lord God; thou art my trust from my youth." Ps 71:5. I knew that my husband and family, the Pastors, the congregation and anyone who knew my situation was praying for me. I needed the Lord to step in, I needed His help. "This is the confidence that we have in him, that, if we ask anything according to his will, he heareth us. And if we know that he hear us, whatsoever we ask, we know that we have the petitions that we desired of him." 1 John 5:14-15.

On St Patrick's Day I was out of bed and after a week, with very wobbly legs, I was trying hard to take a few steps, and by the 25th March I was walking again, all be it, by the holds.

Twenty one days after I was admitted another transoesophageal echocardiograph confirmed that over the previous months the leaking valve had got considerably worse. Some days later I was taken to the RVH for Cardiac Catheterization, results of which were very promising. I had no furring in my arteries and my other valves were working properly.

By this time I had got to know the man who asked the question, but never found out the respondent as I was shifted out of ICU, to await an operation to fix or replace my leaking valve. But before moving, a red bracelet, which read sensitive to Amiodarone, was securely fastened on my wrist.

Much prayer was offered on my behalf. "The prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up." James 5:15. I had written on that day.

I must say at this stage that both Pastors visited me very faithfully. I appreciated their sentiments of comfort from God's Word. Alex Kinghorn was a frequent visitor also and of course anyone who visited me was always more than welcome.

While I was in ward B3 I had many times student doctors around my bed. I was a guinea pig. I never knew whether it was my irregular heart beat or my leaking valve that they were looking for. However it passed the days and sometimes they seemed long, especially when they passed into weeks and eventually into months.

Another scan awaited me this time, my kidneys. It only took 10 minutes and the report was...normal Thank God for his hand upon me. "Then they cried unto the Lord in their trouble, and He saved them out of their distresses." Ps 107:13.

No sooner had I one thing done till another loomed on the horizon, I needed to have my lung capacity checked and I needed to see the dentist, but when?

I was beginning to feel sorry for myself by now as there was no sign of a date for my operation. I was not alone however, there were others waiting longer than me and I wondered how I would cope with the wait. "Be of good cheer, it is I be not afraid," was read to me by a friend.

Sunday 13th April was a red letter day because I got rid of the monitor and all leads and I thought things were progressing. The words of the hymn came to mind "Stayed upon Jehovah, hearts are fully blessed, finding as He promised perfect peace and rest." Resting on this word I had a very good nights sleep and in the morning I was told that my magnesium levels were normal, another milestone reached, how many more?

The Power of Prayer! continued...

Friday 18th April I am in hospital 6 weeks today. It seems a life time already. "What time I am afraid, I will trust in thee." Ps 56:3, I had read.

On the 14th May I was told I would have my operation on 23rd May. I was so excited it was an answer to many prayers, I could hardly wait. I had my dental appointment in the mean time and my lung capacity was excellent. On 21st May I was taken to RVH from where I was immediately returned to Antrim, as there had never been any confirmation of an appointment. I realised it wasn't in God's plan, but I was still disappointed. I was then asked to consider going to Dublin or London for my operation. After prayer and consideration I declined and waited for God's time after reading Ps 27:14 "Wait on the Lord; be of good courage, and he shall strengthen thine heart: wait, I say, on the Lord." I prayed Lord give me the strength to wait more patiently on your timing and your will and give me strength. The option didn't materialise however as I was told funding was unavailable. This option was certainly not in God's plan either.

I was now 12 weeks in hospital. I read the Psalms over and over again and found great comfort in God's Word. "I know the thoughts that I think towards you, saith the Lord, thoughts of peace, and not of evil, to give you an expected end." Jer 29:11. I held on to this during the next week and on Thursday 5th June, Dr Chris told me he had been given a date for the RVH. It was Friday 13th and he asked me if I was superstitious. Dr Trouton would tell me officially on his ward round, and so it was that I accepted the date as God's will and would go to RVH on Wednesday morning 11th June. On Sunday after the confirmation of the 13th appointment I prayed "Please God get me out of this valley of fear, doubt, worry, sympathy and set my feet upon the solid rock so that I will be fit for Friday in Your will."

I had not been able to eat the hospital food, and had lost quite a lot of weight during my 14 weeks stay, but on the run up to the 13th I had a great peace and calm in my heart. On the Wednesday morning I washed, had a good breakfast, took my pills and got weighed. My reading was from Ps 139. Verses 5-6 say "Thou hast beset me behind and before, and laid thine hand upon me. Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is high, I cannot attain unto it." Soon the ambulance came and I was on my way to the Royal.

I was soon settled into a ward with five others, saw several doctors and soon the day slipped past. I still had a great calm in my heart and slept well all that night. On the Thursday morning, as I opened up my Bible and my daily notes I read "Despite our finiteness, our lives rest in the hands of the One who knows all the WHATS, WHYS and WHENS we'll ever face. As we trust in Him, He guides us in the path He desires us to take, ...and His way is never wrong." I knew that God had given me this calm because I certainly had struggled in the previous few weeks. Pastor always said it was frustration. Call it what we may but "sometimes we are not ready to see the wonder of God's wisdom and strength, until we are gasping for breath in the exhaustion of our own strength." About mid morning the surgeon, who was to perform my operation, came to examine me, told me my temperature was raised and that unless it came down he would not be doing my operation. He left after the examination without saying anything. The curtains still remained drawn and about 30 mins later a nurse told me I was going for an ultra sound. While there, with the surgeon present, I heard him say "just as I thought" and I was told that he had some good news for me but he would tell me himself when I would get back to the ward. No sooner had I settled back than he came in, never drew the curtains, sat down on the chair beside my bed and shaking my hand said, "Mrs Mills you don't need surgery, your heart is normal and your valves are functioning properly." After a pause I realised what he had said. I could hardly speak. I asked if this often happened and he said "not often." Well then it must be a miracle I said. There was no comment; he told me I would be going back to Antrim in the morning, soon after I was told to pack my bag. I don't know how many times I had packed my bags, but this time it was with great glee and thankfulness to Almighty God for "I know that, whatsoever God doeth, it shall be for ever: nothing can be put to it, nor any thing taken from it: and God doeth it, that men should fear before Him." Ecc 3:14.

I was dispatched back to Antrim hospital within the hour, not the next day. There I asked one of the nurses to take my temperature and guess what.....it was normal!

Do I believe in the power of prayer?.....I most certainly do!

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The Power of Prayer! continued...

I must thank all the staff of both hospitals for their unfailing commitment, both Pastor Kennedy and Pastor Jones and all who visited me in hospital and at home and all who prayed without ceasing.
